Cultivating mission in marginal places

Experiments in Mission. A learning journey from **URBAN LIFE**.

Experiments in Mission (EiM) is a learning process which draws together people working in different contexts of marginalisation in order to experiment in and reflect together on their practice, and engage with the latest developments in missiology and marginalisation. Groups gather around food for conversation that is rooted in their experiences of mission.

Experiments in Mission involves:

- 8 facilitated 3 hour sessions for a group of between 6 and 10 people, delivered over 12 months. It is hoped that the group will form a strong learning community which can continue to meet, and can include others, beyond the initial year.
- EiM takes a practical theological approach, starting with participants' experience of ministry and mission. Group members are encouraged to identify a theme or question from their current mission experience as the focus for their experimentation. The sessions provide a framework for participants to engage in a detailed exploration of their own context and we will introduce ethnographic research tools which can help with this.
- EiM takes an integrated, or whole-person-in-community approach to doing theology. We believe that learning is life change and that life change involves our whole selves. Therefore we craft each session to engage our bodies, spirituality, emotions, relationships and intellect.
- Each session includes reflection on an experiment participants have undertaken in their mission alongside recommended reading. We have selected specific chapters from texts that relate most effectively to the challenges faced in communities which are experiencing marginalisation.
- We seek to be both liberative and participatory, believing that all people are made in God's image and have revelation to share. Therefore we are careful to be attentive to power and privilege in both our learning and our mission.
